Club Activity Idea: Respect - Peer Bingo

Specific Project (s): Step Up to Leadership 1 and Character Counts!

**Description of Activity:** Learning about respect by using "Respect" Bingo

Age Level: 9 - 11 years

Group Size: 10 and up

**Time Involved:** Preparation time: 10 minutes Activity time: 15-30 minutes

#### **Materials Needed:**

Copies of Respect Bingo Card and pencil for each participant

#### **Activity:**

#### Introduction

How do you want people to treat YOU? That's probably how other people want to be treated, too. Respectful people are polite to everyone. They accept individual differences. Respectful people judge others on their own merits, not on their race, religion, where they were born, whether they are male or female, how much money they have, their physical or mental condition, or anything else.

#### Group Discussion:

- Tell what it means to be "considerate."
- Answer the question: "People know I respect them when ....."
- Answer the question: "My parents know I respect them when...."
- Tell how you can show respect in your 4-H club.

### Community Service Idea That Show Respect:

- Help at the local food pantry.
- Plant flowers, trees, or shrubs at your school, church, or community building.
- Help pick up trash on the playground at school or around the fairgrounds.

#### Peer Bingo

With your bingo card and pencil, walk around the room and try to find someone who matches the description in each box in the bingo card. Ask that person to sign his or her name in each box. Try to fill all the boxes in a line across, down, or diagonally. You cannot have the same person sign in each box.

This activity is to find out more about the people around you. Being a respectful person is respecting others' differences, but in this activity we may find that more people are alike than different. (Do not hesitate to make your own bingo card to fit your audience.)

#### **Discussion Questions**

### Reflect:

- Who found at least 2 people that had something in common with you?
- Who found at least 5 people that had something in common with you? 10? 15? More?
- Will you be able to show more respect to the people in your group now that you know more about them?

#### Apply:

What can you do to show respect to someone tomorrow?
