- T F 3. When a rifle has its safety in the On position this means it is impossible for the gun to fire.
- T F 4. The chief range officer has full charge of the range and is responsible for range safety, and for enforcing all rules.
- T F 5. In passing the gun from the loader to the shooter on the firing line, the barrel of the gun should always be pointed down range.
- T F 6. Always treat every gun as if it were loaded.
- T F 7. It is O.K. to store a loaded or cocked gun in your home as long as you make sure it is locked up.
